WLO Boards of Directors meets in **New Zealand**

As a preamble to the World Leisure Congress in New Zealand, the Board of Directors of the World Leisure Organization (WLO) held its annual face-to-face meeting at the University of Otago. On this occasion, the members of the highest governance body of the WLO reviewed the performance of the organization during the past year and the budget for 2024. They also discussed about the development and transformation of events and programs that would ensure a greater geographical coverage of WLO's initiatives, with the ultimate purpose to ensure the development of leisure worldwide. Finally, WLO Board members devoted some time to acknowledge the contribution of those leaving as they reach the end of their terms. The meeting was held in a hybrid format, and a voting period is now open for the motions put forward during the meeting to be voted by Board members.





A special workshop for PhD candidates is organised during the World Leisure Congress in **New Zealand**

Held in the Otago Business School building on the University of Otago main campus on December 11, 2023, the purpose of this full day workshop was to provide a high-quality learning and networking opportunity for PhD scholars and early career researchers. Workshop activities seeked to develop knowledge and skills for the later parts of the PhD journey and into the early stages of academic careers. The workshop was structured in four parts. In the first panel, Prof. Sandro Carnicelli Filho, Professor of Tourism and Leisure Studies at University of the West of Scotland, Eliza Raymond, PhD student at Victoria University of Wellington, Centre for GOOD Travel, Prof. Rasul Mowatt, from North Carolina State University, College of Natural Resources, and Prof. Marcel Bastiaansen, from Breda University of Applied Sciences and Tilburg University, discussed on "Examiners' perspectives and expectations". This session was followed by a peer discussion-based session titled "Managing change, transitions and feeling like an imposter", which explored coping with the transition from student to staff, settling into new roles and manging (the very common phenomenon of) feeling like animposter. This session counted with the participation of Nikki Fahey, Graduate Wellbeing Coach at the University of Otago. The last part of the workshop was devoted to a double session, before and after lunch, on "Beyond the PhD: Developing a career plan", led by Kathryn Sutherland, Associate Professor at Victoria University of Wellington, and Professor Rachel Spronken-Smith, from the University of Otago. The workshop was a unique opportunity for emerging academics to network with fellow scholars and internationally recognised academics.



World Leisure Congress Field School 2023: A Journey of Discovery in Dunedin

The World Leisure Congress Field School 2023 "Multiplicities of leisure: seeing through other lenses", a unique event blending education with cultural immersion, was held in the beautiful city of Dunedin from December 7-11, 2023. The event brought together 15 students from WLCE Vancouver Island University, Texas State University, and Western Sydney University, offering them an extraordinary opportunity to explore and learn. Resonating with the congress's theme "Learn Well, Live Well," it aimed to enhance inclusion in leisure. It provided a learning experience to deepen students' understanding and commitment to the leisure needs of underrepresented groups. They engaged with the local Māori and Pacifica communities, the gueer community, and with those working to support the leisure needs of people with disability issues, participating in various community-driven leisure activities.

Researchers from over 20 countries present their work at the WL Congress 2023

Over 50 general and special sessions were part of the program of the World Leisure Congress 2023, held in Dunedin, New Zealand, on December 11-15. With 2-3 presentations in each, during these sessions, experts from many different countries - over 20 - presented their research work on wide range of topics connected to leisure and its different forms – tourism, sports, culture and recreation. Among these, the topics of the WLO Special Interest Groups (SIGs) were represented (Leisure Management; Diversity, Access and Inclusion; Leisure and Gender; Leisure and Ageing; Leisure and Wellbeing; Leisure and Sports; Leisure and Children and Youth; Leisure Education, and Travel and Tourism. Besides these, a significant number of presentations focused on the topic of Events, with some specific sessions devoted to this topic - "The paradoxes of events studies as a form of leisure session" or "Adaptation and innovation of events in times of crisis". WLO Chief Operating Officer (COO) Dr. Cristina Ortega led the special session "Higher education and innovation in the field of leisure around the world in the face of recent global challenges", where she also delivered a presentation with the same title resulting from a study conducted in the framework of the Global Relevance Committee formed by national and regional leisure associations and the WLO.



WLO celebrates its annual General meeting in New Zealand

On December 13, 2023, the 2023 General Meeting (GM) of the World Leisure Organization was held, in the framework of the 2023 World Leisure Congress organized by the University of Otago in Dunedin, New Zealand. The GM is our annual gathering, where WLO members, Board of Directors and staff meet each other to discuss on the work done and the way forward. This GM was particularly special, since we were finally able to reunite face-to-face, after a long time working and meeting virtually. On this occasion we opened the door for anyone interested in our work to join the meeting and provide inputs which will help us define our future. WLCE Panel Discussion: Advancing Global Perspectives in Leisure Education

The third day of the World Leisure Congress, December 14, 2023, started with the World Leisure Centers of Excellence (WLCE) Panel Discussion, chaired by WLO Chair Prof. Joanne Schroeder and WLCE network coordinator Dr. Arianne Reis. The panel counted on the participation of representatives from the different WLCEs, such as Dr. Aggie Weighill (Vancouver Island University), Dr. Marc-Andre Lavigne (Université du Québec à Trois-Rivières), Prof. Dr. Ricardo Uvinha (University of Sao Paulo), Prof. Dr. Marcel Bastiaansen (Breda University of Applied Sciences), Prof. Dr. Jane Zhou (Zhejiang University) and Brent Lovelock (University of Otago). It offered interesting insights into the evolving landscape of leisure education and research. Panelists underscored the significance of the WLCE network as a platform for promoting international cooperation and knowledge exchange. They highlighted how the network facilitates unique partnerships between institutions and scholars, enabling a multifaceted approach to leisure research. Discussions revolved around the challenges and opportunities in integrating different cultural and academic perspectives in leisure studies, emphasizing the need for a more global and inclusive approach to understanding leisure's impact on society.

On December 13, Brazilian delegates attending the congress hosted a virtual gathering to connect with their colleagues who could not travel to Dunedin. This connection enabled those in Brazil to interact with attending Brazilian scholars, exchanging insights, and discussing how to contextualize the congress's learnings within Brazil's unique leisure landscape. This virtual connection with the event in Dunedin, New Zealand, underlined the significance of integrating the Global South's perspectives to enhance the underrepresented regions' academic and practical approaches to leisure.











WLO Awards recognize five prominent figures in the leisure field

The WLO Awards was celebrated during the World Leisure Congress at Otago Museum in Dunedin, on December 14, 2023. The WLO Community of Excellence recognition was awarded to Shangyu District, and prominent figures who have contributed to the development of the leisure field were awarded the Thomas & Ruth Rivers International Scholarship, the Cornelis Westland Humanitarian Award, and the George Torkildsen Literary Award. The Ceremony closed with a tribute to Prof. Danilo Santos, who recently passed away, in recognition to his enormous contribution as the Director of Sesc Sao Paulo since 1984.
