

If you recognize culture's power to unlock climate action, join our global call to the COP to put culture at the heart of climate policy.

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
UN Tourism's 3rd World Sports Tourism Congress report

Children and young people are significantly more active when they have a positive attitude to exercise

Sport England's Active Lives Children and Young People Survey for the academic year 2023-2024 has found that one of the biggest determinants of physical activity levels is children having positive attitudes towards exercise.

The annual report summarizes sport and physical activity behaviours of 5- to 16-year-olds in the UK. The definition of physical activity covers fitness activities, gym, dance, cycling, sport, walking, scooting, active travel, team sports, swimming, active play, and informal activity.

Researchers found that where children had three or more positive attitudes towards physical activity (counted as happiness, resilience, and trust), 62 percent were active, 17 percent were fairly active, and 21 percent were less active.
