

#### **World Leisure Congress 2025: Transforming society through** leisure

From August 25-28, the vibrant city of Breda, the Netherlands will host the 18th World Leisure Congress, bringing together leisure professionals from over 30 countries. Hosted by Breda University of Applied Sciences in partnership with the World Leisure Organization, the congress will explore how leisure can help build more inclusive, resilient, and sustainable societies.

Under the theme Leisure for a Better Society, the event will offer sessions covering pressing topics like social justice, sustainability, digital transformation, and human well-being.

Attendees will discuss how responsible tourism can transform communities, the role of urban public spaces in promoting inclusion and

health, and innovative uses of technologies like virtual reality and digital twins to address environmental challenges. Panel discussions will also explore how leisure relates to identity - including gender, sexuality, disability, and race – as well as how play and creative expression influence youth development and intergenerational engagement.

This year's program includes a rich lineup of WLO-led sessions designed for students, researchers, and professionals to explore the transformative power of leisure in diverse contexts. Learn more about these sessions here: WLO sessions at WLC 2025.

Another highlight of the Congress is **Industry** Day, organized with CELTH (the Dutch Centre of Expertise on Leisure, Tourism, and Hospitality), which connects academic research with real-world challenges through site visits and interactive sessions with industry leaders.

# Dr. Hazel Maxwell participates in keynote panel at 50th Leisure Studies Association Annual Conference

WLO Board Member Dr. Hazel Maxwell participated in a keynote panel at the Leisure Studies Association (LSA) 50th Anniversary Conference 2025.

The session, titled **Justice in the Face of Polycrisis: The Future of Leisure?**, brought together leading international scholars representing a cross-section of academic leisure organizations to mark LSA's 50th anniversary.

The discussion highlighted the growing importance of leisure in today's society while recognizing that worldwide access to leisure is unequal. The panel focused on the many overlapping global crises – social inequalities, environmental problems, and challenges related to space and communities – which affect how people experience leisure, and explored how leisure scholars can respond to these complex issues through fair and thoughtful approaches. The goal of the session was to find ways to create more just and inclusive leisure opportunities, both now and in the future.

Dr. Hazel Maxwell is a highly accomplished leisure educator and practitioner with more than 30 years of experience in the UK, USA, and Australia. She is currently an academic at Western Sydney University and has held leadership and editorial roles across several international leisure and sport organizations.

#### Austria's COOLYMP project: Redesigning public space through climate-sensitive urban planning and community engagement

On June 24, 2025, the city of Innsbruck, Austria officially opened the redesigned Dr. Alois Lugger Square as part of the COOLYMP project — a transformative initiative to turn sealed, overheated surfaces into inclusive, climateresilient spaces for leisure and social life.

Located in the heart of Innsbruck's Olympic Village, the square was previously a shadeless concrete expanse. Today, thanks to close collaboration with over 400 residents, it has become a 'green living room' filled with trees, water features, elevated green zones, and a multifunctional stage that invites everyday use and connection.

At its core, the COOLYMP project is about sustainable, participatory urban planning. Residents helped shape every stage of the project – from debating ideas to planting vegetation – showing how local engagement can drive resilient and meaningful change.

"Living isn't just about the apartment — it's always about the surrounding environment," noted Franz Danler, Managing Director of IIG, Innsbruck's housing company, underscoring the focus on quality of life.

The redesign has increased green coverage from just 0.34% to nearly 25%, and surface temperatures are expected to drop by 3-4°C during summer months.

Beyond Lugger Square, the project also includes the redevelopment of Olympic Park and Ander-Lan-Straße, with a total of over 8,800 m² of public space being revitalized to promote accessibility, climate adaptation, and everyday leisure. The initiative is monitored by the University of Innsbruck and partners to assess long-term impact, offering a replicable model for people-centered urban transformation.

#### Kinshasa hosts first UN Tourismbacked World Music and Tourism Festival

Under the High Patronage of H.E. Félix Antoine Tshisekedi Tshilombo, President of the Democratic Republic of the Congo, and in partnership with UN Tourism, Kinshasa successfully hosted the inaugural World Music and Tourism Festival from July 16-18, 2025.

Held under the theme **The Rumba Route for Peace**, the Festival celebrated
Congolese Rumba – recognized on UNESCO's
Representative List of the Intangible Cultural
Heritage of Humanity – as a driver of cultural
identity, tourism, and inclusive growth.

Over three days at the Central African Cultural and Arts Centre (CCAPAC), participants engaged in policy roundtables on musical diplomacy, artists' rights, youth innovation, and destination branding, alongside performances, a cultural village, exhibitions, and a Rumba-themed gala.

The event brought together partners including UNESCO, the African Regional Intellectual Property Organization (ARIPO), Sony Music Entertainment, and Sound Diplomacy, along with cultural leaders from Africa, Latin America, and Europe.

UN Tourism Secretary-General Zurab
Pololikashvili remarked: "This Festival celebrated
Congolese creativity while fostering local
development, regional cooperation, and
international understanding."

# GM Active study reveals the power of health intervention programs


