

Later in the month, we served as Conference Partner of Qatar Travel Mart (QTM) 2025, where WLO curated a three-day program bringing together leaders from culture, heritage, hospitality, innovation, and wellness to explore the future of travel and community well-being.

WLO at IBTM World 2025 in Barcelona

The World Leisure Organization (WLO) participated in IBTM World 2025, held from November 18–20 at Fira Barcelona Gran Via, Spain. As one of the world's leading events for meetings, incentives, conferences, and exhibitions (MICE), IBTM World brought together more than 12,000 professionals and 2,500 exhibitors to explore the latest trends shaping the global experience economy.

The 2025 theme, **'Creating Connections that Matter'**, highlighted innovation, inclusion, and legacy-building in business and cultural events.

Representing the WLO Secretariat, Communication and Events Officer Mireia Iglesias attended on Tuesday, November 18, engaging with industry and institutional partners. Through its participation, WLO strengthened partnerships and increased its visibility within the global events sector, reaffirming its commitment to **sustainable and people-centered approaches** to event design and leisure management. The organization also emphasized the essential role of **creativity and culture** in supporting global cooperation and well-being.



WLO at Qatar Travel Mart (QTM) 2025

The World Leisure Organization (WLO) was proud to serve as a **Conference Partner** of Qatar Travel Mart (QTM) 2025, held from **November 24–26** at the Doha Exhibition and Convention Center (DECC) under the theme 'Bridging Cultures, Connecting Futures'.


The QTM 2025 Conference, which was curated by WLO, brought together more than 40 international leaders to examine how **culture**, **sustainability**, **wellness**, **and innovation** are reshaping the future of travel. Across three days, the program highlighted key ideas and emerging trends driving destination development and community well-being.

On Monday, November 24, the session on **Culture and Heritage Tourism,** led by Chair of the WLO Board Prof. Joanne A. Schroeder, explored how storytelling, design, and innovation help preserve heritage while creating meaningful, sustainable visitor experiences.

On Tuesday, November 25, the focus shifted to **Hospitality, Innovation, and Sustainability,** chaired by WLO's CEO Dr. Cristina Ortega Nuere. Speakers discussed how technology, design, and talent investment are shaping a more responsible and resilient hospitality industry.

On Wednesday, November 26, under the leadership of Dr. Sandro Carnicelli, Editorin-Chief of the World Leisure Journal, the session on (Mega) Events, Wellness, and Health Tourism examined how global events and wellness tourism contribute to wellbeing, economic growth, and destination competitiveness.

QTM 2025 showcased Qatar's growing role as a **forward-thinking hub** for global travel and cultural exchange. WLO's active participation reinforced its mission to promote leisure as a catalyst for **sustainability**, **cultural connection**, **and social innovation**, while contributing to international dialogue on the future of tourism and community well-being.



WLJ: Record growth in 2025 downloads

The World Leisure Journal (WLJ) continues to expand its global reach, achieving recordbreaking engagement in 2025. According to third-quarter data, downloads rose from 18,897 in 2024 to 24,460 in 2025, marking a **29% increase** and, for the first time, surpassing 20,000 downloads every quarter.

This steady rise underscores the journal's growing influence and the relevance of leisure research in addressing key social, cultural, and environmental issues.

Under the leadership of Editor-in-Chief Dr. Sandro Carnicelli, WLJ continues to publish highquality, interdisciplinary work that connects leisure to well-being, sustainability, and innovation.

WLCE Vancouver Island University to host the 2026 Canadian Congress on Leisure Research

The World Leisure Centre of Excellence (WLCE) at Vancouver Island University will host the 2026 Canadian Congress on Leisure Research (CCLR) from June 24–26, 2026, in Nanaimo, British Columbia, on the ancestral unceded territory of the Snuneymuxw First Nation.

Organized under the theme 'Leisure is Transformation', the Congress will bring together scholars, practitioners, and academics from around the world to examine how leisure can inspire and sustain social, cultural, and ecological change.

The Congress program will feature **keynotes**, **presentations**, **panels**, **workshops**, **and interactive sessions**.

Building on the **seven dimensions of leisure** — Recreation, Travel & Tourism, Parks & Trails, Arts & Culture, Sports, Festivals & Events, and Play - CCLR 2026 aims to foster dialogue across disciplines and highlight innovative approaches to well-being, inclusion, and sustainability.

By hosting this international gathering, WLCE Vancouver Island University reaffirms its leadership in advancing leisure research and knowledge exchange.

The Congress reflects the ongoing contribution of WLO Centers of Excellence to global scholarship, promoting leisure as a transformative force for communities and a pathway to individual and collective wellbeing.


Dr. Paul Gilchrist – "Other Everests: The Heroic in Leisure"

UN Tourism confirms new Secretary-General: Shaikha Al Nowais to become first woman leader in 2026

UN Tourism has confirmed Shaikha Al Nowais as its next Secretary-General, marking a historic milestone as the first woman to lead the United Nations specialized agency for tourism.

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Therme Group outlines plan to welcome 100–120 million guests globally in the next 15 years



At the Global Wellness Summit in Dubai, **Robert Hanea**, founder and CEO of **Therme Group**, outlined plans to expand accessible social bathing experiences to **100–120 million guests** over the next 15 years.

He emphasized the need to democratize wellness through large-scale, affordable facilities that foster **community**, **belonging**, **and shared urban experiences**, rejecting negative views of 'crowding' as contrary to the social and health benefits of communal bathing.

Challenging the Eurocentrism in Volunteering | World Leisure Journal

This paper critiques dominant Eurocentric models of volunteering, arguing that they overlook the **diverse cultural meanings and practices** that shape volunteering as a leisure experience. By examining the limitations of these frameworks, the authors highlight the complexity and variability of volunteering experiences across contexts and call for approaches that recognize **culturally-driven interpretations** of leisure and **empower individuals** to define their own participation.

From Pictures to Perceptions: Instagram's Role in Shaping Volunteer Leisure Experiences Abroad | World Leisure Journal

This study examines how Instagram shapes volunteer tourism by analyzing posts using the hashtag **#voluntourism**, their narrative imagery, and interviews with 27 volunteers. Findings

show that Instagram's visuals and captions emphasize the volunteers themselves, thus encouraging participation and influencing motivations and perceptions. The research highlights how social media mediates 'voluntourism' experiences and contributes to ongoing ethical debates about the gap between online portrayals and offline realities.

Benefits and Opportunities of International Volunteer Tourism – Sustainable Travel Post-Pandemic | *World Leisure Journal*

This publication provides a critical overview of the volunteer tourism industry, tracing its rapid growth and exposing **the shortcomings of profit-driven models** that often fail to benefit local communities. The authors identify challenges, such as mismatches between volunteer skills and local needs, and insufficient preparation for volunteers. Importantly, the study outlines **strategies for more equitable, sustainable, and meaningful volunteer experiences**—identifying steps travelers and organizations can take to create more responsible, effective, and community-centered volunteer experiences in the post-COVID context.
